Standard French

Parisian or 1etropolitan French is considered to be **Standard European** French.

Other dialects in France include Marseillais. Occitan, Breton, Basque, Alsatian, **Auvergnat and** Corsican.

Canadian French

Québécois French is spoken in Quebec. The grammar is the same as standard French but the accent is more nasal.

Acadian French is spoken on the maritime coast of Canada.



Haitian Creole

Haitian Creole is the French spoken in Haiti. It includes a mixture of African languages as well as other languages from colonial rule, such as Spanish and **Portuguese**.

African French is entirely based on standard French, and it incorporates a wide range of variations and dialects, as French is spread across 34 territories and countries in Africa. Pronunciation can differ notably, particularly with the letter R, as well as the letters D, T, L and N.
